Received from Dorset Libraries -

"Following from Dorset Libraries involvement in the attempt to set a Guinness World Record..... although we were unsuccessful in setting the record, the attempt itself has made its way into the Guinness World Records 2016 edition and appears on the Editor's letter on page 8.

During 2015 Guinness World Records Editorial..... processed 39,740 applications, 4,281 of which were ratified as official Guinness World Record titles. To have featured in the editor's letter is a fantastic recognition of all the hard work put in by everyone involved."

Summer Reading Challenge

This summer found many of Colehill's young people taking up the challenge to read six books during the summer. 193 signed up and a magnificent 134 completed, the Library frequently resounding to cheers and rounds of applause as each medal was awarded and the tail of our bookworm grew steadily longer.

In the spirit of this year's Record Breakers theme we set out to issue at least 2000 books for young people during the period of the Challenge. Congratulations to all concerned WE DID IT. What is more, the statistics show that borrowing of children's books at Colehill between April – Sept 2015 was up by over 7% on the same period in 2014.

Remember that Colehill runs its own 100 Book Challenge for young people and is being taken up enthusiastically
