In Salisbury last year, I purchased a "little book of Brunel", idly curious to see what mention was made of my putative relative, Sir Daniel Gooch, who was Isambard Brunel's chief engineer and who, I learnt, became a director of the Great Western Railway and left a fortune (but no children).

In the book there is a chapter 'The Thames Tunnel - the eighth wonder of the world' relating how Marc Brunel (father of Isambard) created the world's first tunnel under a river by excavating via an innovative tunnelling shield what has become the Rotherhithe tunnel. It took 18 years, opening in 1843.

In 1869 work began on the Tower Subway using the cylindrical boring shield created by James Henry Greathead. The name seemed familiar from Parish Council days, so I checked the internet, and indeed he did have a daughter, Mary. Was this our local benefactress, Mary Greathed?

So, it got me up to London to find the Brunel Museum, and incidentally visit my grandaughter, catch up with old friends, revisit the National Gallery and even check out the site of the controversial Garden Bridge over the Thames.

All thanks to a little book. Where could *your* reading take *you*? *John Gooch, Chairman*.

The Legacy by Katherine Webb

This is the second Katherine Webb novel that I have read, the first being 'A Half Remembered Song'. I wanted to read that one because it was set in Dorset and it did have a good sense of Dorset.

I found this 'The Legacy' to be a very frustrating read. She writes well and is easy to read and you root for the characters, but then it all gets too silly and you lose your sympathy. It piles improbability onto improbability, not only in the modern day bits but in the flashbacks as well, so that in the end you just don't care. Caroline is obviously supposed to be unsympathetic but you have to believe in her actions and I didn't, particularly the abandoning of the baby. And how come no-one discovered any of this, both the escape from New York then the whole baby thing?

The travellers come out of this well with their enthusiasm in taking in stray children but I found the whole Harry/ Henry plot deeply morally dubious. I also guessed it quite early on but again stretching improbability and coincidences far too far and seemingly approving of letting things lie – what about his parents!! They have a right to know!! If anyone is a fan of Anne of Green Gables as I am then they will have seen a similar plot done much much better in Anne's 'House of Dreams'.

So all in all an easy read and I wanted to get to the end to find out what happened but left feeling vaguely unsatisfied with the whole thing.
