

Notification by e-mail, letter etc

Many of you will now be aware that the Dorset Library Service is operating a fully automated service for the notification of overdue reminders and courtesy advice when reservations are available for collection at the library.

Borrowers are able to choose to receive this information by **e-mail, SMS (text), or second class post.**

Those borrowers who have been accustomed to receiving phone calls from Colehill about their book requests may like to talk to us about their future preferred method of contact. We will be very happy to help and to ensure that all your contact details are up to date.

Fee changes

There have been some changes to fees from the 1st July 2017. A full list is available in the library. A reminder of the main charges are:

Overdue charges: books

Borrowed on an adult card	20p per day
Maximum overdue charge	£9.00
For children	No charge

Hire periods

DVDs - 1 week hire period, **talking books** - 3 weeks hire period, **music CDs** - 1 week hire period

Charges are made per hire period and are as follows:

Adult talking books - £2.20, **Music CDs** - £1.10, **Premium DVDs** (New titles) - £3.00, **Standard DVDs** - £2.50, **Information DVDs and other children's** - £1.00, **Language courses** - £2.20

All Audio visual material may be requested/collected from Colehill.

Nature Notes – It's the little things ...

What caught my eye today, late June, whilst walking on the library path was a little thing. Not the sky-blue of the nearby Forget-me-not, nor the vivid Orange Hawkweed but a delicate, creamy white sputnik on a thin green stem bouncing about in the breeze. There were a few of them in the lawn, all about a foot tall with near neighbours of a drab, papery brown. Their lance-shaped leaves confirmed my suspicion.



These inoffensive toughies are Ribwort plantain, known by others across the country as Short bobs, Hard heads, Fire-leaf, Lamb's Tongue (my own childhood memories from the Hampshire downs) and, for the warmongers amongst us, Carl doddies or Soldiers and sailors.

As a soldier, pluck a stem with a good-sized head, wind the stem once round itself like a noose just below the head, and pull. The head flies off like a catapulted stone giving a soft thump to its target. In the game of Carl doddies these weapons are swung like conkers. I read in Richard Mabey's Flora Britannica that 'Carl and Doddie are diminutives of Charles and George, and the name of the game is an obvious memory of the '45 Jacobite Rebellion, with Bonnie Prince Charlie and King George III trying to knock each other's heads off'.

Walk to the library but watch out – there be weapons dotted about! *Christine.*
