This was unanimously approved at the recent FoCoL AGM on 4th April and so all FoCoL assets and funds, which have grown significantly over the last year thanks to the very active fundraisers, are to be transferred to CCL Ltd where they will be accounted for as part of the combined fundraising effort.

Although this means that the form of FoCoL will change it does not mean the end of the need for friends of the library; in fact that need is still as strong as ever. It is envisaged that friends are members of the community who, whilst unable to volunteer, wish to register their support for the library by making a regular annual subscription or donation; under the new arrangement, as a registered charity, this gives the added advantage of eligibility for Gift Aid. *

The AGM was made more convivial by the inclusion of wine and nibbles provided by Val and Bill Seddon and concluded with

a surprise presentation to me by Peter of a handsome mounted nautical barometer and clock unit. Thank you one and all, and particularly to the Committee for their support throughout the challenging years and to all of you members for your support, which unquestionably ensured that we still have a library, and so I trust will continue under the new arrangement.

It is gratifying to see that the library has been a sustained success since coming into the hands of the community last year; run 'by the community for the community' has been outstandingly demonstrated. The wonderful improvements to the entrance area also show confidence for the future, and the growing number of Special Interest Groups shows the benefits of organic growth. So, it is not just about books. As a researcher from the Department of Health Sciences at Leicester University reported recently; many users keep talking about what they get out of the building itself. For many of them the library is a therapeutic place.

Popular Author: David Baldacci

The best-selling thriller writer David Baldacci tells stories about the American Secret Service and the Washington DC corridors of power. Many of his plots and characters are based on his real-life contacts with undercover agents.

He began writing stories as a child, when his mother gave him a notebook in which to record them. He wrote for more than two decades, penning short stories and later screenplays without much success. While practicing law, he turned to novel writing, taking three years to write *Absolute Power*, published in 1996. It was an immediate international best seller and to date, Baldacci has published 27 best-selling novels for adults as well as four novels for younger readers.

Baldacci and his wife, Michelle, are the co-founders of the *Wish You Well Foundation*, which works to combat illiteracy in the United States. It aims to support family literacy by fostering and promoting the development and expansion of new and existing literacy and educational programs.

As they say, "Imagine your daily life, the information you process, the decisions you make based on that process and the actions you take based upon your decisions. Now imagine doing all these things while either being unable to read or reading at a below-average level. Well, you've successfully imagined the daily lives of nearly 100 million people, half the population of the United States. A country that was founded on the principles of free speech, free press, and the freedom of religion -- all rights tied inexorably to words -- is fast becoming an illiterate nation. The ability to read is the foundation for everyday life. Indeed, virtually none of the major issues we face as a nation today can be successfully overcome until we eradicate illiteracy. That's why we created the Wish You Well Foundation."

Needless to say he is a strong supporter of libraries. What should be of concern to us is that he and his wife could just as well be referring to the UK where illiteracy and ability to express yourself clearly is a growing problem.


