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Chairman's Message

May has arrived and given us hope for a good summer to come. For me it is also the time when my tenure as Chairman of Colehill Parish Council comes to an end after what have been three eventful years.

On a very positive note we have seen the security assured of our **Community Library** and in the first year of being run by the Community and for the Community it has blossomed into something more than just a place for borrowing books. It is a focal point for all the residents of the Parish with several interest groups meeting there regularly and a burgeoning section for young people with an appetite to read.

Further good news is the announcement that the rebuilding of the **Youth and Community Centre** (The Reef) will start this summer. It has been ten long and difficult years work to get to this stage. There have been serious disappointments along the way and it is to the eternal credit of hard working fund raisers and organisers that this point has been reached. Hopefully the rebuild will be completed promptly and that this time next year we will have a facility for our young people and other community groups to use and for us to be proud of.

One of the most difficult issues that we have dealt with over the last two years has been the **Core Strategy**, East Dorset District Council's blueprint for the future development of the area over the next fifteen years. An important article on this process is contained in this newsletter so that I will not dwell on the issues but suffice it to say that a number of Parish Councillors have devoted hours of work to this matter and presented a strong argument to the Government Inspector over some three weeks during last autumn. To us it does not seem that local residents representations have been given proper consideration. To me personally it seems wrong that Colehill and Wimborne should carry the brunt of urbanisation rather than a balanced District wide development. Much remains to be done but this will continue to be a thorny issue over the years.

Another important matter that is now under way is the **East Dorset Community Governance Review**. Again there is a significant article and a questionnaire included in this newsletter. The subject sounds boring but in reality it is anything but because it will, once concluded, influence local government and local income and expenditure for the foreseeable future. Please do read the article and respond to the questionnaire, it is of considerable importance and will ultimately set the pattern for our own Parish community. In our response we want to reflect your views.

I am grateful to so many people within the Parish who have helped and supported me over the past three years. I have had the privilege of visiting schools and organisations, interest groups and residents all of whom reinforce my belief that Colehill really is one of the best places in which to live.

Lots of extra tweets for Colehill

Local Colehill resident and wildlife enthusiast Victoria Peacock had an idea to engage and raise awareness amongst young people about the importance of local wildlife including nesting birds in Colehill local habitats and woodland



On Saturday 22nd February, at the end of school half-term week in Colehill, Victoria, supported by Colehill Councillor Janet Dover and staff from the East Dorset District Council Countryside Wardens ran a special event for young people in Olivers Park, Colehill. This event was to encourage more birds to nest in the trees in the woodland part of Olivers Park (Churchmoor Copse) and the children were able to build their own bird nesting box with pre-cut wood, nails and hammers supplied by the Countryside Wardens.

Many young people and their friends and families attended the event, which was the first one of its kind in Colehill. A total of ten nest boxes were built from scratch by the youngsters using the wood, nails and hammers supplied.

Councillor Janet Dover said *"I am so pleased to be able to support Victoria with her fantastic idea for local children. The weather was kind and all the young people and their friends and families had a great day."* Several bird boxes were hung on trees in Churchmoor Copse at the end of the day. Janet and Victoria were grateful

for the enthusiastic help and advice of the Rangers from Moors Valley Country Park, Emma and John, who supported the event. They gave excellent guidance and supervision to the young builders to ensure that there were no tears or banged fingers during the bird box construction. Victoria hopes to encourage another similar day of activity in the summer holidays and Janet Dover has pledged her support.

The Core Strategy

Have we reached the end of the road?

On Monday 28th April East Dorset District Council voted to adopt the Core Strategy (CS) for East Dorset and Christchurch. The result of this decision will be the building of 2500 houses in Colehill and Wimborne, 1300 of them on the Green Belt. Despite a very robust and credible campaign to reduce the size of these developments, our words fell on deaf ears and EDDC voted 24/7 in favour of the Core Strategy. We now expect the planning applications to be made within the next few months and whatever the views of Colehill Parish Council, these applications will almost certainly be granted by East Dorset District Council.



The background to the Core Strategy

In 2007, under the Labour Government, the Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS) was set up to determine the housing need for the country and the regions in particular. EDDC had responsibility to assess the local housing need. One of the sites under consideration was the land to the East of the Cranborne Road, adjacent to Burts Hill and up to Dogdean where 400 houses were proposed. In June 2009 the then leader of the District Council, Cllr. Spencer Flower, wrote to John Denham, the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, rejecting outright any plans to develop this site on the grounds that this was protected green belt; the rural landscape; severe traffic congestion and flood risk stating that many of these problems could well be insurmountable.

In May 2010, under the new coalition administration, the RSS was scrapped, the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) came into force and plans to develop a Core Strategy for housing were put in place. EDDC, together with Christchurch Council, was tasked to assess the housing need for the area for a 15 year period from 2015 to 2030. EDDC commissioned Broadway Malyan, a global architecture, urbanism and design practice, to consider sites around Wimborne Minster appropriate for development and to prepare masterplans for urban extensions or new neighbourhoods. EDDC determined the 'search areas', almost all of which were in the Green Belt, having set the criteria that the sites had to be close to local services and facilities. The Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA) identified numerous sites but most of these were dismissed as being too remote or too small for developers to consider. Many of these are in parts of Colehill already developed with thriving neighbourhoods.

Despite rejecting 400 homes on the Cranborne Road in 2009, the same leader of the council, Spencer Flower, now leader of Dorset County Council, accepted the recommendation that not only should this site be included in the CS, it should be more than 50% larger with 650 houses, a replacement school, community and retail facilities and on both sides of the Cranborne Road. Colehill Parish Council has repeatedly asked for an explanation as to this dramatic change of policy but none has been forthcoming.

In March 2013, after almost 2 years of 'public consultation', EDDC submitted its CS document to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. We were advised that an Examination in Public (EiP) would take place and Colehill Parish Council set up a working party to formulate a response to the EDDC's CS together with its own recommendations. We also asked on numerous occasions for the significant sites identified under the SHLAA but rejected by EDDC, to be reconsidered in lieu of the Cranborne Road site, the single largest development in East Dorset. Our requests were dismissed. During the public consultation period, this site received the greatest response from the public who overwhelmingly objected to the proposed development.

In September 2013 the EiP took place and Colehill Parish Council made representations at all relevant hearings. The Council took every opportunity to stress that we welcome housing development but 2500 homes was simply not sustainable for our communities. Sadly, despite our very robust challenge to EDDC's plans, the Inspector found the CS to be 'sound and justified' in her report that the Parish Council received at the beginning of April.

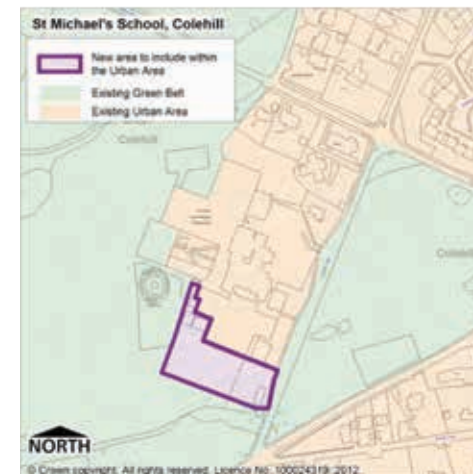
Where do we go from here?

The working party will continue to meet on a regular basis and is currently considering whether there is a case to appeal the decision made by the Government Inspector. Should the decision be taken to go down this route, the working party will have to indicate its intention to challenge the outcome of the EIP by the middle of June 2014 (6 weeks from the date of adoption of the CS by EDDC). This is not a decision to be taken lightly as this would almost certainly result in a Judicial Review which will cost thousands of pounds. The first step will be to seek legal opinion which is a cost-effective way of establishing the validity of any challenge. We will keep residents informed about progress on these matters.

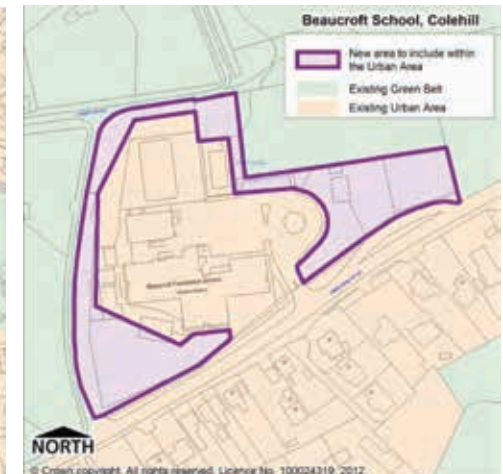
How will the proposed developments affect residents of Colehill?

Traffic - It could be argued for many residents living on top of the hill "not a lot". However, what about the residents who live in the Parmiter area and Furzehill who will be directly affected? All will be troubled by noise, dust, dirt, heavy lorries, traffic diversions, rat-runs, pollution, traffic chaos and gridlock and all of this going on for anything up to 15 years. At the same time, developments will be taking place at Cuthbury, Cowgrove and Stone Lane. Routes in and out of Wimborne and Colehill will all be severely affected at Canford Bottom, Canford Bridge, Walford Bridge and Julians Bridge, areas already known for regular congestion and traffic backlog. Lynda King, Planning Officer at EDDC, recently stated that gridlock in and around Wimborne was to be expected! So, it has a lot to do with us and we simply cannot bury our heads in the sand.

Education - The development planned for the Cranborne Road will have a new school. This is not an additional school, it is a replacement school for Wimborne First School which is at capacity. The new school should deliver an additional 100 places but these will soon be filled as residents move in to the New Neighbourhood. Traffic movements will almost certainly increase at peak times because a significant number of children that currently walk to school will be delivered and collected by car as the distance for some of the younger pupils will simply be too far for them to walk. The Parish Council raised these issues on numerous occasions, including serious concerns about road safety. Colehill could also be faced with the closure of Hayeswood School with a replacement school being built on the south side of the Leigh Road on the New Neighbourhood site. Parents will be faced with crossing the extremely busy Leigh Road to drop children at school; many will resort to using their cars because of the safety concerns. The provision of a footbridge or underpass has been raised by Colehill Parish Council on many occasions but no guarantees have been given that this crucial safety feature will be provided.

Schooling in general is of major concern as there is no provision within the CS for increase in Middle School provision. Allenbourn cannot expand because of site restrictions and St Michael's is on Green Belt so development could be problematic: both schools are at capacity. QE School, despite only opening in 2012, is at capacity and the proposed new Upper School in Verwood is not likely to come on stream until the end of the CS period in 2030 or until 'critical mass' is reached, in other words, until no places are available within catchment.

Health - The working party also raised the issue of medical health provision within the CS. No additional doctors or dental surgeries are planned and it appears from enquiries made that local practices have not been consulted about their ability to provide quality healthcare for several thousand people moving into the New Neighbourhoods. A significant number of these will be young children and older adults, a number of whom will require additional and specialist healthcare provision.

Employment - Employment is another area of considerable anxiety to all on the working party. Stone Lane Industrial Estate which currently provides lucrative employment for many thriving small businesses will be demolished to make way for additional housing. There are no plans within the CS to provide well paid, skilled jobs within Colehill and Wimborne resulting in all those of working age moving into these New Neighbourhoods having to commute out of town to their place of work. The development on the Cranborne Road is of particular concern as it is the “wrong” side of town and roads through Colehill could become rat-runs for those needing access to the A31. This could mean an unacceptable increase in traffic at peak times and could result in significant safety issues for the hundreds of children that attend the 6 schools within the parish.

To sum up, we could be faced with extra time on journeys to and from school; to and from work; delays and congestion due to construction vehicles moving in and out of the building sites many times a day, 6 days a week; difficulty in parking; access to shops and services being disrupted; even longer waiting times to see a GP or dentist as the residents occupy the New Neighbourhoods; difficulty in obtaining places in local schools with many children having to attend schools out of catchment.

What will we continue to fight for?

Colehill Parish Council has NEVER been opposed to new housing, in fact we have argued for development of affordable and social housing to meet the needs of local people. We believe all our young people should aspire to own or rent their own home and we believe priority should be given to people in need that have strong ties to the community. EDDC’s own assessment for local housing need (Colehill & Wimborne) is for 720 homes over a 15 year period, not 2500 proposed in the CS. This level of housing could easily be absorbed, providing integrated and cohesive communities. We will continue to fight for this and to ask why the communities of Colehill & Wimborne are being asked to take 50% of the whole of East Dorset’s housing requirement. We will robustly challenge the planning applications and use our best endeavours to influence the size and design of the New Neighbourhoods.

Colehill will be affected by these developments. A case can be put forward that we could benefit from infrastructure provision such as new sports clubs and sports grounds on the Leigh Road. There will be replacement schools and we might win the case for a medical centre in Colehill. Areas of recreational space (SANGS) will be part of the new developments. However, this will all be at a cost.

The Parish Council needs the support of residents when making the case for local housing for local people. Under the NPPF, up to 50% of housing being proposed on Green Belt should be affordable or social housing but there is absolutely no compulsion on the developers to provide this. EDDC state that they are aiming for 35% overall affordable housing which could result in some New Neighbourhoods providing little or no low-cost housing. The developer could just be asked to make a financial contribution to affordable housing which will do nothing to solve local housing needs. The overwhelming majority of the houses being proposed on all the sites in Colehill & Wimborne will be high cost, high quality open-market housing. After all, the developers are commercial enterprises and maximising profits has to be their priority. In July 2013 the average house price in East Dorset was £292000, almost 15 times multiple of the average salary putting owning a home out of the reach of the vast majority of our young people.

The communities of Colehill and Wimborne will be changed for ever. We must fight for change that we want: change that will enhance our communities and enable them to grow and thrive. We must be actively involved in shaping this change and not just accept change that is being imposed on us.

'I still can't quite believe it!'

After 10 long and frustrating years The Colehill & Wimborne Youth & Community Centre Is to go ahead

It is 10 years since committee members of **The Reef** and **Wimborne Youth Clubs** got together and floated the idea to rebuild the Reef. A limited company was formed, with charitable status, and fund raising started to knock down the old caretaker's bungalow adjacent to St Michael's School and replace it with a two storey purpose built building. This has not been easy but at last I am pleased to announce that we have secured all the funding needed to turn our vision into a reality.



The old bungalow provided as a stop gap provision by Dorset County Council has been the home of the Reef Youth Club for many years. Cramped conditions have meant that there has been limited membership for some age groups and it has been exceedingly difficult to provide a varied, quality youth service. New and larger premises will enable the expansion of pursuits offered to young people, especially during winter months. The building will have an open, flexible recreation area on the ground floor: the upper floor will have a kitchen, coffee bar, computer suite and a quiet room for study. It will have a lift for people with additional needs.

Earlier this year we took the decision to move from a Traditional building to a Timber Frame building on the grounds of cost but keeping to the original design. This decision reduced the Capital cost of the project by approximately £200,000 without jeopardizing the quality, or the longevity of the building. It also has the benefit of reducing the build time. A contract for the project has been negotiated with Complete Solutions Europe, a local builder in Bournemouth. The Timber Frame for the building will be manufactured in Latvia and a production slot has already been booked so that it will arrive as soon as the ground works are completed in late July.

It is planned to hand over the site to the main contractor on the 7th July in order to demolish the existing building and prepare the foundations for the new build with the really heavy work being undertaken in the school summer holidays. It is anticipated that the new unfurnished building will be completed by the end of October.

The community support has been amazing, there have been many volunteers and many individual supporters, including local churches and their congregations, who have donated not only their time but have also contributed financially to the project and for this our Charity is immensely grateful. We have also received significant support from Dorset County Council, East Dorset District Council and unwavering support from Colehill Parish



Council and Wimborne Minster Town Council. A significant number of Local Trusts have helped us too and in their honour a Sponsorship Board will be created and displayed in the reception area of our new building.

Of course the good work doesn't stop now. Fundraising will continue to equip the building with modern up to date catering, play, sport, education and entertainment equipment totalling approximately £20,000. The committee is also working on the administration, staffing and business plan to ensure that the facility remains sustainable and viable. Beaucroft - Red Cross Hospital in Colehill

Beaucroft stands in Beaucroft Lane, Colehill, Wimborne, Dorset. The present dwelling is divided into three properties, Beaucroft, High Point and Court House. The house was originally built for Thomas Rawlings, Wimborne Solicitor and property speculator, on the South slope of Colehill c1876.

The property was occupied by Mrs. Bernarda Lees, widow of Thomas Evans Lees, a Cotton Mill owner from Oldham, Lancashire. Bernarda Lees was born in Mexico in 1841 and died at Beaucroft in 1912. The house was left to her daughters.

Beaucroft was offered to The Red Cross by the Executors of Mrs Lees estate and opened in December 1915 as a Auxillary Hospital. It came under Southern Command, Commandants Miss E.B. Kemble and Miss Carr Glyn, and was staffed by Volunteer Aid Detachments, (VAD's) of part-time doctors and nurses.

Staff were recruited both locally and from overseas, some were offered lodgings in Colehill. Local people were involved in supplying the hospital with food, milk and even entertainment.



Wounded soldiers were sent to Beaucroft from the Front for surgery and convalescence. Many soldiers who recovered sent postcards thanking the doctors & nurses for their stay at Colehill.

A couple of the Nurses kept diaries of their time at Beaucroft including photos of some of the patients and staff.

The Hospital was closed for a short time in 1915 but then remained open until 1919. It returned to a private house for a few years before it was occupied by US troops in World War 2, prior to the Normandy Landings.

The Youth Cancer Trust helps reduce the sense of loneliness, which often accompanies long stays in hospital and time off school. Long term friendships are formed. Families are given a much deserved break knowing their child is having fun and being looked after. The activities provided on a holiday range from horse riding, water sports and dry slope skiing. The emphasis is on fun and relaxation.

Peter Coole, Choir Master, said he is delighted that the choir is supporting such a worthwhile cause. *"The Community Choir was set up to bring people together to enjoy making music and singing. Life Education Wessex

Life Education Wessex (LEW) is a children's charity working with the community and schools to help children to make positive healthy choices in life. Specially trained Educators, ably assisted by Harold the Giraffe, and purpose-built mobile classrooms create a unique and memorable environment in which to deliver a series of fun and age appropriate health programmes for children aged 3 to 13 years. The sessions equip children with the knowledge, skills and self confidence to form positive attitudes, make healthy choices and avoid risky behaviours. Publications will return completed forms to you, on request, and the perpetrator can often be identified. If you ever feel threatened by unsolicited mail or telephone calls, you must report the matter to the Police.

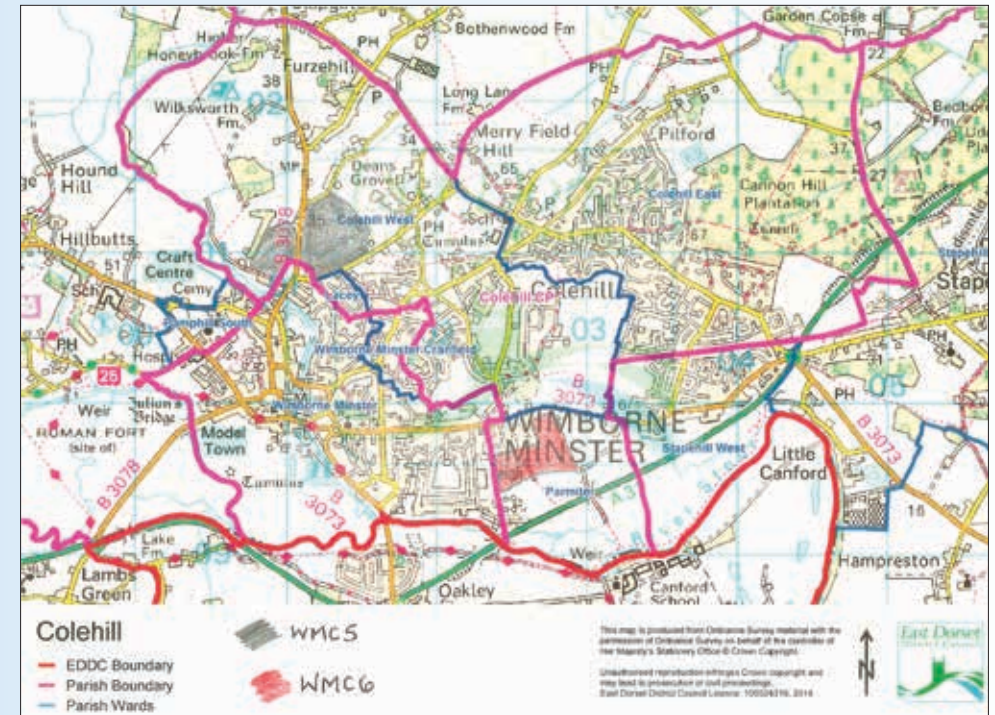

Community Governance

All change - and not necessarily for the better

The world we live in is constantly changing. But some changes threaten the way we live and are unwelcome. After the shock of the adoption of the Core Strategy by East Dorset District Council (EDDC), and the now certain prospect of 650 houses along the Cranborne Road and another 350 south of the Leigh Road – all in Colehill West – comes the review of Community Governance by EDDC.

What is this all about? The administrations of East Dorset and Christchurch councils have merged to save money (about £1M a year each). East Dorset has agreed to reduce the number of district councillors from 36 to 29, and this will increase the geographic size and population of each district ward. In future Colehill East ward will extend to the Canford Bottom roundabout taking in Hayes, and Colehill West will extend to the Stour, south of the Leigh Road. There will still be three Colehill district councillors, but the number in Wimborne will reduce from 3 to 2 under the new proportions.



These changes will take effect from May 2015, as will all other ward boundary changes across East Dorset. The District Council wants to review all parish** boundaries (ostensibly to make them fit the new district wards) to bring about improved and stronger community engagement, more cohesive communities,

better local democracy and more effective and efficient delivery of local services. A Working Party of four district councillors, who are not parish or town councillors, has been set up to make recommendations to EDDC before the end of 2014. So what's the problem?

EDDC has asked for suggestions for change and is empowered under local government legislation to consider the following:-

- Creating, merging, altering or abolishing parishes;
- The naming of parishes;
- The electoral arrangements for parishes;
- Grouping of parishes under a common parish council;
- Altering boundaries between parishes.

The terms of reference give us the opportunity to suggest alterations to Colehill parish boundaries: e.g. to take in Hayes because it will be part of the district ward of Colehill East, and Stapehill district ward will be abolished as such; to take in the new development south of the Leigh Road because it will be part of Colehill West district ward. But equally other parishes can, and probably will, threaten to absorb the development along the Cranborne Road. This is especially vulnerable because the Wimborne First School is due to be relocated there. Moreover, with the Wimborne Minster Town Council precept being over £100 for a Band D property the prospect of a gain to the town of over £65,000 a year is almost irresistible. Quite a number of town and district councillors have already shown a strong interest in making such a bid.

The Working Party says that it will not initiate proposals for change, but will take into account suggestions that help to meet the criteria of improved local government at parish level (see the third paragraph). These suggestions must be communicated to EDDC by 6th July 2014 and can be from any interested parties, including individuals.

We have both opportunities and threats. Many residents will feel strongly that we should stay as we are, but unfortunately this is a weak and untenable position. We need to think through what are reasonable propositions that can be supported by logical argument. We have much strength in our community and in the Parish Council and we do not want them emasculated.

It is essential that the residents of Colehill engage in meaningful debate about the future of the parish and how they want the community to be represented and governed at local level.

We will be holding a series of Parish Meetings to formulate our position and we urge you to attend. In the meantime please complete the attached Questionnaire and return it to Colehill Parish Council as indicated.
