Our MP, Michael Tomlinson, will be holding a surgery in the library on Friday, 18 September from 2 to 3.30 and the Parish Council will be meeting in the library on 10th Nov. *John Gooch, Chairman*.

#### **Diary Dates**

If you're going to **Bletchley Park** on Wednesday, 16<sup>th</sup> Sept., please be at the library by 8 am so that the coach can leave promptly – it's a long way to Milton Keynes! We hope to arrive there by noon (plenty of eateries on site), leave at 5 pm and be back in Colehill by 8.30 pm at the latest (comfort stops planned in both directions).

Other fund-raising events coming up are:

**Friday Night is Music Night** in the Memorial Hall on 30<sup>th</sup> October, this time with a concert entirely from the very versatile Jubilate Singers. Bring your own drinks and nibbles. £6 tickets from the library.

**Hall & Hearty** - a 3 course dinner prepared by Tim Maddon, ex-River Cottage chef, on 20<sup>th</sup> November, in the Memorial Hall. Tickets £25, BYO drinks.

We're also planning occasional talks in the library itself, on Wednesday evenings, and the first one will be on 23<sup>rd</sup> September at 7.30 pm when John Bunting will talk on the life and times of the Honeybee. John has kept bees in and around Colehill for over 25 years. The session will include the lifecycle and size of the honeybee colony, harvesting the honey, the difference between clear and set honey, hay fever and honey, what to do if you see a swarm of bees, what are 'killer bees', and more.... and there'll be time for questions.

Another talk is booked for **4**<sup>th</sup> **November** - Linda Bunting is a volunteer with the Dorset Wildlife Trust and will talk about its work. She is specifically involved with the Great Heath Team based at Beacon Hill, creating a corridor for wildlife that stretches between the Purbecks and the

New Forest to compensate for the dramatic loss of wildlife habitats in the last 70 years. The remnants of this landscape still make up an amazing wildlife resource, with significant areas of national and international importance. The area has been described by Natural England as one of the most important areas for wildlife in the country.

There is no charge for these talks, but wine, tea and coffee will be available and donations are always welcome! Please sign up at the library if you plan to attend.



At the end of July Tracy Baines joined about 20 of us in the Library to work on our community writing project. People shared ideas and some read poems, stories or memories which they had written. Others shared lists of memories which got everybody joining in with "I remember...".

We discussed a short list of guide lines to help any one who wants to send in a piece to be included in our anthology:

- must be about life in Colehill past or present (or even future)
- no more than 500 words (and may include pictures)
- any genre poem, story (fact or fiction), personal memory or account
- all pieces may be edited if necessary, and inclusion in the anthology is not guaranteed (we will aim to include at least one piece from everyone participating)
- please remember to ask permission to share memories or pictures which are not yours or include children.

#### The Pledge

Thank you all for taking part in this year's attempt to set a new world record for most pledges received for a reading campaign. Although there was a fantastic response to the record attempt we have been informed that nationally the target for a new world record was not quite reached. The Reading Agency has announced that almost 80,000 pledges were made between the 10 and 13 July at libraries up and down the country which was a fantastic effort by all. Sadly 100,000 pledges were required to set a record.

The pledging events in Dorset exceeded their target of 1000 pledges, achieving a total of 1084 of which 111 were made at Colehill Community Library. Well done us!

## The Summer Reading Challenge

The Summer Reading Challenge got off to a splendid start on the  $11^{\rm th}$  July with over 60 young people signing up to start. This number has now grown to 190 and at the time of writing over 80 medals have been awarded.

Remember everyone who signs up and completes the Challenge at Colehill Library will be entered in to a draw for a chance to win the **2016 edition of The Guinness Book of Records**. The draw will be on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> Sept.

There is still time to sign up and complete the Challenge. We set our own challenge at Colehill to see if we could issue at least 2,000 children's and teenage books during the period of the challenge. We are at over 1650 with several weeks to go! Keep borrowing and keep reading!
