

# **Nature Notes - Blushes in the library garden**

It's the time of year when wandering around the library garden can produce a few blushes. It's not that embarrassing rush of blood to the head I mean here but a chemical change that is so noticeable that the English name, 'Blusher' is used around the world. As I write, late August, the fungal fruiting body of Amanita rubescens has been and gone on the lawn by the library door but it may show again. When fresh, a damaged cap edge or chunk from the stem flushes red within seconds then fades a little to give the damaged fungus a blushed hue. They fruit, on and off, over a long autumn and come up most years in the garden.



This is one of the many fungi that has a touching relationship with the trees nearby. Its millions of fine mycorrhizal strands (think rootlets) selectively join up with tree roots to make a two-way transfer system gaining food from the tree at the same time providing to the tree water and a wide variety of nutrients from the soil including hard-to-extract trace elements. The pines nearby could be having a helpful boost to healthy growth from our fungus and we get a visual treat as the fungus pops its head above ground to spread its spores.

The film director James Cameron knows about this association that many fungi have with the living organisms around them. It inspired him to push the idea further, imagining a forest moon where all the organisms are connected. If you watch the 2009 film Avatar, ponder on the humble Blusher's underground world. *Christine*.
