What about the stock?

The support available to community libraries varies enormously across the country. Thanks to the hard work and cooperation on all sides the 8 in Dorset have a good relationship with the Dorset Library Service. The stock at Colehill is refreshed throughout the year with new and stock books from the Dorset Library Service plus donated items. There are over 2.5 million books and other materials currently available via the request service and you can have them delivered to Colehill library. However, Dorset Library Service will be spending significantly less on new books and other items in 2018/19 to help balance its budget. This is being done as an interim step whilst work is undertaken on developing the future library service offer. This will mean fewer new books and reduced range of magazines and papers supplied by the council's library service.

Open - but sometimes closed

Just a reminder that our opening times are the usual six sessions a week as below. The building is also used for group meetings, usually on a Thursday or Friday morning, when the library services are not available. There will be a notice on the front door advertising the sessions, to which all are welcome.

The opening times are to the right of the door and are: Monday, 2–5; Tuesday, 9.30–1 and 2–5; Weds, CLOSED; Thursday, 2–5; Friday, 2–6.30; Saturday, 9.30–12.30. We are closed on Bank Holidays (Mondays 7 & 28 May).

We look after any personal information you share with us

In late May, the new data Protection Act (GDPR) will come into force, with new regulations on how organisations can process your personal data. These changes are to protect your personal data from being used in any way other than for the reason that you supplied your data to us.

We may collect personal data from you when you enquire about becoming a Colehill Community Library supporter, a member of Colehill Community Library Ltd (this is not the same as joining Dorset Library Service (Libraries South West)), or a volunteer or when you purchase tickets for a library event.

571 men from parish of Wimborne went to War. 164 never returned. Was one of these men your ancestor?

School children collected acorns and horse chestnuts to be sent to the cordite factory at Holton Heath, Poole.



Was anyone in your family in the Cadet Training Corps, the Scouts or the Girl Guides? They might have pulled the $2\frac{1}{2}$ ton German Howitzer Gun, 'a war trophy', from Wimborne station to Redcotts recreation ground on 20^{th} Sept, 1919!

Were any relatives voluntary nurses or members of Red Cross at Beaucroft House, Wimborne, or at Wimborne Workhouse Infirmary on East Borough?

Did anyone in your family watch the parade of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment which was billeted in Wimborne for 19 weeks in the spring of 1915?

Did anyone work at the Victoria hospital or help bring the wounded from the ambulance trains?

Who was sent to the Wimborne St Giles Prisoner of War Camp and what work did they do? (OS ref: SU014005)

What order did King George ask the clergy to read out every Sunday in May 1917?

The Colehill postmaster got the news of the Armistice by telephone at 11.30 a.m 11th November 1918. What did he do? The 'Broncho Bill's circus' came to Wimborne on June 24th 1918. What an ideal way to spy on the defence of a town! What war work was secretly carried out at the Eclipse Works (New Borough) under the ownership of J. W. Flower?

How did people cope when their horses had been taken for the army cavalry? (with thanks to Jan Seal for these suggestions - Ed).

Nature Notes – Tumbling black towers
