Councils appoint Dorset's first shared Chief Executive

David McIntosh has been appointed as the first shared Chief Executive for Christchurch and East Dorset councils and takes up the post in January, 2011.

This partnership has been created in light of public sector funding cuts and will save each council around £50,000 annually, with further savings being made by sharing other senior management posts in the near future. It is anticipated that this will reduce the cost of running the two councils by around £300,000 and is the first stage in a planned package of savings. However, each council will remain independent, keep their separate identities and retain their own Councillors and budget: council taxpayers' money from one council will not be spent by the other.

Your Parish Needs You!

May 2011 will be your opportunity to elect your local councillors to represent you at Parish and District Council. We, at Colehill Parish Council, are your most local representatives as we all live within the Parish, send our children to local schools, use local services and understand and often experience, the problems that arise from time to time. Now is an ideal time for you to get involved with your community and help shape it as we face difficult and uncertain times. Members of the public are always welcome at our meetings, please come along to see for yourself.

Most people's impression of what a councillor does is just attending council meetings. However it is the ordinary day to day contact with local people that a councillor experiences in their community that is the most important part of being a councillor. Councillors act as ambassadors for their community, keeping everyone aware of local needs and concerns and reporting back on district, county and regional changes.

The main skill needed is being able to listen. You need to listen to the views of people in your community. It is this knowledge that many public bodies and organisations acknowledge is the hardest to capture and they use the parish council for advice to assist and inform their services. (continued over)

You will need to attend meetings. Most are held on Tuesday evenings and all councillors are expected to attend the Council meetings held every six weeks. There are also two committees, Planning and Finance and General Purposes, some councillors serve on both, but you need only serve on one if you prefer. You may also be asked to attend civic functions as part of your duty to the community. This entails Remembrance Parades, civic walkabouts and public functions to name a few.

You will need to draw on your own skills and experiences and it is the sharing of these that makes the Council strong. Working as a team you will deal with employment issues, budgeting, asset management, grant funding and lots more. Accounts are kept by the Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer, but it is the councillors who are responsible for the financial decisions. Councillors make a group decision on all matters; no one councillor is responsible for any single decision. This is democracy at its best.

Training is available for all councillors and legislation allows for councils to pay for this training. New councillors can instigate new procedures and embrace good practice.

If you are over 18 years you can stand as a councillor, but you must be registered on the electoral register for the parish or, for the last 12 months, you must have occupied premises in the parish, worked in the parish or lived within 4.8 km of the parish.

The number of councillors required for Colehill Parish Council is fifteen; this amount was set by East Dorset District Council. If you wish to stand for election you need to contact Julia Duncan at East Dorset District Council (01202 886201) before the end of March 2011.

Those who are elected in May 2011 will sign a Declaration of Acceptance of Office and agree to observe a Code of Conduct when dealing with matters on behalf of the community.

Government Spending Review

At the time of writing we are waiting for the outcome of the Coalition Government's spending review, due on the 20th October. Dan Povey, finance manager for EDDC, said that they are as much in the dark as the general public and until they have been informed by Whitehall they cannot predict the effect that government cuts are going to have on local communities. We must not be panicked into thinking that services are going to be withdrawn overnight: the plans, once approved, will be rolled out over a 5 year period. EDDC will do all it can to protect local services: the Parish Council is committed to doing the same. It's time for all of us to do a bit of belt-tightening!

Play gets a boost in Colehill

Following a planning decision by East Dorset District Council the sum of £20,000 has become available to improve the play area and surrounding play field at Oliver's Park.

Janet Dover, County, District and Parish Councillor, has been asked by the Parish Council to liaise between East Dorset District Council, the Dorset Police Safer Neighbourhood team for Colehill and youngsters who use Oliver's Park, to invite them to come up with suggestions.

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2012 Olympics, are we going to be grid-locked?

The Parish Council has expressed serious concerns regarding the proposals for Canford Bottom Roundahout in time for the 2012 Olympic Games. Weymouth Portland will be the host for all the sailing events and impact on local motorists could be considerable as the A31 will be the main route for traffic travelling from London to Weymouth.

The "Hamburger Junction" proposed will create a 4 lane road (2 in each direction) through the centre of the roundabout to join the North and South sections of the A31. Traffic lights will control the flow of traffic but with no plans to improve the roundabout at the other end of the Wimborne by-pass, as well as the controversial decision by Poole Borough Council to close the link road A349 from Gravel Hill to the by-pass, it begs the question how is this going to help any road users?

Colehill Parish Council has made representation to the project engineers, Mouchel, asking for reassurance that residents are not going to be unfairly inconvenienced either by trying to travel to Ringwood, Ferndown and beyond or by traffic using Middelhill Road and Smugglers Lane as a cut-through. The effectiveness of lane segregation will depend on the signing strategy and was of high priority. The Parish Council has requested a meeting with Mouchel after the one scheduled for July was cancelled. Construction, due to start next year, should be completed by the last quarter of 2011, well in time for the start of the Olympics in July 2012. The future of this development is still in question, as funding from central government remains uncertain.

Middlehill Road Chicanes

Minor amendments will have taken place during the October half term and will help to reinforce the operation of the traffic calming: the priority operation will remain the same. Additional buildouts will be constructed to further encourage motorists to give way when they don't have priority.

This must be one of the hottest topics in the parish and elicits columns of newsprint in the local media. The calming measures were installed as a direct response to the very large number of residents that requested them during the survey for the Parish Plan. The decision on what was put in place rests solely with Dorset County Council and these were made after a considerable period of public consultation. Whilst we can comment and pass on residents' concerns to that body, they ultimately make the decisions.

Almost exclusively the complaints that have been received relate to the fact that the 'give way' signs do not relate to 'an obstruction on that side' and are thus confusing. It is this that the alterations are intended to address. It is, we believe, important to give this a chance and see if it is effective before making further representations to Dorset County Council. The electronic surveys, carried out since the inception of the calming measures, all show a significant decrease in speeds in Middlehill Road.

Take care of our feathered friends

We all love seeing wild birds in our gardens but just as we do they feel the cold, need warmth, shelter and a hearty meal. Here's a few tips on how to help these welcome visitors survive the winter months.

- Feed twice daily if possible in the morning and early afternoon, before it gets dark
- Introduce a bird table and high calorie seed mixes: this can also be used to put out kitchen scraps such as fat and suet, mild grated cheese, cooked potatoes, pastry and soaked fruit.
- Put out hanging feeders for black sunflower seeds, sunflower hearts, sunflower-rich mixes or unsalted high fat peanuts.
- Ensure a supply of fresh water every day. If it is very cold use tepid water, but it is vital NOT to use any antifreeze products, which can be poisonous
- Put out unwanted apples and pears for blackbirds, song thrushes and other members of the thrush family.
- Bird cake and food bars are very good because of their high-fat content. Food bars of fat hung up or rubbed into the bark of trees is a great help for treecreepers, goldcrests and many other species.
- Put up nest boxes to provide roost sites for smaller birds. They will then be used for breeding later in the year.

The Core Strategy - make sure your voice is heard!

East Dorset District Council has launched a 360 page document for consultation. It deals with possible options for the delivery of the sort of development seen as necessary to meet the needs of all our residents and businesses. In other words, the way we want things to be from now to, say, 2027. Once you mention the word development people respond with: Oh, you mean more houses. Well, that is one of several basic needs which have to be balanced against other conflicting demands. But it is by no means the only factor as we consider infrastructure, transport, and the natural environment. There are critical issues, problems and challenges to be overcome.

The document is about our future and is in line with the Coalition Government's Localism Agenda, giving the local communities an opportunity and power to shape the future of their area. A number of policy options are set out, based on a significant amount of evidence, data collection and the outcome of previous consultations in 2008 and 2009.

EDDC now wants to know what your views are on this comprehensive plan. The document can be seen on DorsetforYou, http://www.dorsetforyou.com/, and in the libraries. The consultation period runs to December 2010. Your comments will be used to inform the Draft Core Strategy that will be published in the Autumn of 2011, and be subject to a public enquiry.

A bit of TLC for your garden

The end of the growing season signals the perfect time for a spot of routine maintenance. You might think the lawn pretty much looks after itself, but it will benefit from raking over to remove leaves and from an application of lawn fertiliser. When the herbaceous borders are empty of flowers it's a good time to check whether any structural repairs need doing. Check walls and fences for signs of wear, and repair any loose panels or holes. Wobbly paving stones can also be secured, but ensure you choose a dry spell to do any cementing. If you have a pond, remember to cover it with a net to prevent falling leaves polluting the water, and if it has fish ensure it never freezes completely to enable them to breathe. A good way of doing this is to put a child's ball on top of the water. When the pond freezes, just lift off the ball and you have a ready-made hole

Planning Ahead

Bulbs can be planted - snowdrops, daffodils and crocuses are the earliest, with tulips flowering a bit later in the season, so check the labels before you buy to guarantee a succession of colour. This is an ideal time to plant or move shrubs and trees, to allow them to anchor down before the growing season. Also take time to reflect on what was successful in this year's planting scheme and what didn't work so well, so you can adapt your plans for next year.

Introduce Colour & Interest For The Colder Months

It may seem like everything dies back in the winter, but there are a few hardy little souls who flourish at this time of year. Cyclamens come in white and a range of pink shades with glossy green leaves, and add a welcome dash of vibrancy in the depths of winter. Pansies and their miniature cousins, violas, are a favourite and do especially well in a sunny spot. It's also not a bad idea to include plants that offer winter interest in your long-term planning. Trees and shrubs with interesting bark and stems provide structure in the summer and are still good to look at in the winter.

Council Tax Referendums, a burden for cash-strapped councils?

Eric Pickles, Sec. of State for Communities and Local Government, is proposing to give residents the right to veto high council tax by abolishing capping and giving local people a stronger role in determining the annual increase. A period of consultation has just ended, with parish, district and county councils being asked to submit their comments to the Department for Communities and Local Government.

The Coalition Government intends introducing legislation at the earliest opportunity making it a legal requirement for councils to conduct referendums if it is deemed that the increase in council tax is excessive. Under current ruling, the Secretary of State can take capping action but this can make it very difficult for councils to plan their budgetary requirement. Parish and Town Councils set a precept to enable them to support neighbourhoods and communities and this is shown on the council tax bill. It is recognised that council tax payers should be protected against excessive increases but are referendums really the answer?

The Government is proposing that any billing authority that sets an excessive council tax increase must hold a referendum of all local registered electors. The organisation and cost of this will fall to that same billing authority, with little opportunity to recoup the costs involved. If, as a result of a referendum, the proposed increase in council tax is rejected, the billing authority would have to issue new bills to every household immediately and offer refunds or credits against any future liabilities.

For Town and Parish Councils, the main concern is the time and cost involved, should the Government introduce this legislation. We all want to see fair council taxes and we give a great deal of consideration to local needs and the general economic situation prior to setting the precept. However, these costs could prove too onerous for a small Parish Council and ultimately could add to the financial pressure that many billing authorities find themselves under.





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Bosnia, the forgotten country

David Torring and his brother John are planning another aid trip at the end of October to Bosnia, a much forgotten country now the media have lost interest. The Bosnians are making a huge effort to rebuild their economy but schools, orphanages, hospitals, paraplegic associations and families associations often get left behind. The mine clearance programme, (Bosnia has more mines than any other country in the world second only to Cambodia), is painfully slow as they just do not have the money and there is very little international aid.



The last convoy consisted of six Landrovers with 3.5 tonne trailers: they took over 12 tonnes of aid to a centre for people with mine injuries, a paraplegic association for distribution to the disabled (many from the war) as well as clothes and nappies to several families associations. Genesis, who's primary function is to teach conflict management and mine awareness training to children, helps distribute this desperately needed aid to various bodies and organisations, all of whom express their gratitude to the people who donate to the convoy.

Some of the aid was collected locally and a big thank you to all who helped. Colehill First School, who collected clothes and shoes, are also making up Christmas shoeboxes for us to take. Ferndown First School have had a change of uniform so have made a collection of the old uniforms. Again a very big THANK YOU to all! David and John will be away from the UK for eleven days, three travelling out, five in Bosnia and three returning. David tells us, "A tiring and emotional trip but well rewarded, just by the look on the recipients' faces."

Overgrown hedges are a hazard

Good hedges make good neighbours: or so the saying goes. Well-kept hedges beside the footpath enable people to walk along unimpeded and enjoy our lovely countryside and village life around Colehill. Over-



grown hedges, obstructing the pavements, create a dangerous situation for people with disabilities and the visually impaired, as well as pram and wheelchair users.

Dorset County Council has a duty to protect the rights of the public to full unobstructed access to the public highway under the Highways Act 1980, Section 154. DCC has asked the Parish Council, when it becomes aware of a problem, to contact the owner/occupiers of the properties to advise them that they are in breach of the law. The County Council has the powers to require the breach to be remedied, failing which it or its agents can undertake the work and charge the owner/occupiers.

In doubt about the regulations? Contact the Parish Clerk, who can provide you with a leaflet: you can also report clear breaches to the Parish Council. Autumn is a particularly appropriate time to take action so please cut your hedges back. You will greatly improve the appearance of the neighbourhood, and make the pavements safer for everybody.

BMX Track one of the best in the country!

It will probably come as a surprise to most Colehill residents that we have a recreational facility that is in great demand nationally. The BMX track in Coombes Wood, Smugglers Lane is so highly regarded for its



adrenalin-charging jumps that riders from all over the country come to take on the challenge.

A group of very enthusiastic Colehill youngsters, together with parents and pro-rider Josh Brooks and Andy Walker, have had a meeting with the Parish Council to discuss designing a separate trail for inexperienced, young riders as well as modifying some of the larger jumps to enable the older children to grow in confidence before attempting the really big jumps.

Jack Hare, 15, acting as unofficial spokesman for the Colehill youngsters who regularly use the BMX track, said that the jumps are important to them for a number of reasons. He said it is something that youths of all ages can use together and making some of the jumps easier for junior riders means that they can all meet up locally, rather than having to travel further afield to find jumps that they can do. He also said that it gives them an interest and keeps them "off the streets", a view supported by our local PCSO Matt Johnson. Jack said, " I ride every day which is good exercise. I enjoy it - it's my passion and it would be good to see younger children getting into the sport. I believe that improving these jumps would encourage that." And, who can argue with that sentiment?

The Parish Council supports the development of the BMX track but this has to be done sympathetically with environmental sensitivities taken into consideration during the consultation stages. It is hoped that the new jumps and improvements to existing ones will be undertaken during the winter-time, a natural off-season for the track, ready for the start of the new BMX season in March.

Comment: Having met a number of the young people using the track it is clear how important this facility is to them. Their enthusiasm is infectious and their determination to "own" this track and not to allow it to be trashed by others, is a credit to them. Perhaps we should consider "rewarding" them by holding a BMX competition next year. Anyone interested in sponsoring this for our local youngsters? Ed.

The Reef, almost there!

Fundraising is moving on at a good pace now with £360,000 of the £475,000 target identified. Funding has been achieved through generous pledges from various charitable trusts and grants from local councils. The Committee is about to appoint an architect, which will move the project on to the tendering stage, with March 2011 the target date to start the building works.
